PROFILE TALK - MAUREEN FARRELL



Maureen commenced by describing her childhood and schooling in Melbourne and Adelaide and went on to outline her subsequent life as an engaged and passionate teacher. Firstly in Adelaide, then in Melbourne, she taught in both Catholic and State primary schools. After initially working in high migrant intake schools in Adelaide she moved into Teacher Librarian positions in Melbourne and undertook a relevant Masters degree at Melbourne University. She outlined how, with the encouragement of a school principal, she was empowered to establish and run a Resource Centre in a school for many years.

She was also able to work closely with teachers in planning units of work, integrating the necessary skills and providing the resources available into the classroom teaching. After a change in school leadership, she set about meeting and mastering these challenges without being involved in the planning. She managed the introduction of computers and supported and developed other teachers' skills in this area. She then extended this support to parents. She concluded her talk by describing how she felt she had *lived and breathed* her role as a teacher librarian and expressed disappointment at the subsequent downgrading of the position in many schools, particularly now with the explosion of information and the need for students to have the necessary skills to access and use this information. Now that she has retired, her grandchildren haven't escaped the lure of children's literature either.

APRIL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

In the *Message from the President* (see above), several matters considered at the meeting are discussed. Some other issues considered at the meeting are noted below.

The existing grant from the City of Boroondara was used to support the Planning Meeting held on the 11 February 2025. Some \$800 of that grant remains to be spent. The Committee discussed options for use of these residual funds, including making a contribution to updating the Club's website (Adrian Farrell is investigating this matter) or to publish a flyer that would promote awareness of the club and its activities.

In addition, the City of Boroondara is now calling for applications for a \$10,000 grant. Jim Green is investigating options. One option is to subsidise the Lakes Entrance Getaway. Colin Palethorpe advises that buses will cost about \$7,000. The \$3,000 balance could be used to subsidise the accommodation of members who live in the Boroondara Municipality; there are some 47 members in that category. Members are invited to register with the Honorary Secretary their interest in presenting to the General Meeting a short presentation on matters of interest to them including volunteering activities.



REPORT OF COFFEE AND CONVERSATION APRIL 22 : AUKUS – DEAL OR NO DEAL



The discussion was initiated by a paper presented by Don McAllister

The participants were well informed and there was a consensus that the decision to embark on AUKUS was difficult to understand, to justify, or to support.

There were a number of concerns expressed, and questions raised, including:

- Why do we need new submarines? For defence or attack?
- The problem of obsolescence as a result of:
- o New detection methods (radiation, thermal plume, and magnetic image).
- o Rising use of drones and other unmanned devices.
- o Further development of smart missiles, up to and including intercontinental supersonic devices.
 - What are the motives and outcomes of the agreement Is it a form of colonization? Will it result in a loss of Australian sovereignty?

- There was concern about the risk to Australia compared to existing arrangements. Are we going to be a strategic target?
- There was the problem with the involvement of someone like Boris Johnson at the outset.
- There was concern that USA's agendas are further confused by a chaotic administration, with no end in sight.
- The UK Government is currently reviewing their ability to support/participate in the AUK part of the program.
- There was the issue of Australia's ability to support the project with the appropriate manpower at all stages of the proposed scheme.
- There was a view that any significant increase in defence spending should be in Research & Development.

Basically, our C & C group thought that as of April 2025 Australia's defence interests could be better served by something other than AUKUS, which means "No Deal"

MAY VISIT – SKYDECK EUREKA TOWER

10.30 am Tuesday 20 May

Our May visit is to the Melbourne Skydeck, which can be found perched on top of the Eureka Tower, a skyscraper located in the Melbourne South Bank precinct. On offer are stunning 360° panoramic views from the highest observation deck in the Southern Hemisphere.

Occupying the entire 88th floor, the Skydeck features twenty viewfinders that help visitors to pinpoint numerous significant landmarks around all of Melbourne, along with several free binoculars for use. As the public is only allowed after 12:00 pm, we'll have the whole venue to ourselves for the visit.

We'll meet at 10:30 am at Admissions on the ground floor of the Eureka Towers. Included in the price of \$30 per person are: admission to the observation deck via the building's very fast lift, a fun facts and landmark guide; and scones served with jam and cream and tea or coffee. 

CULTURAL NOTES – REVIEW OF MAKING AUSTRALIAN HISTORY

Making Australian History by Anna Clark (2022) reviewed by Maureen McAllister



As the title suggests this book is about the approaches to studying and writing Australian History since the earliest days of white settlement. It is timely though controversial, as it throws a light on the new understandings of our past, some highly contested, that have been developed by new generations of historians. These new perspectives have come about as the result of new evidence and additional sources becoming available; aboriginal history being the most significant but not the only example.

The world of Australian History has changed dramatically and aborigines are now included. But these changes have led to controversies and a more contested history.

This contested history provides part of the context for Anna Clark's book which, however, takes a longer - term view of how Australia's history has been written and the people, not all of them historians, who have done the writing.

Anna Clark is the granddaughter of the late Manning Clark, arguably the foremost and most prominent of recent historians of Australia, though she largely leaves him out of her narrative. At school we were all taught a defined and progressive version of Australian History and in my case this extended to the way history was approached at Melbourne University. It was later referred to as the "Three Cheers" version of our past with a good dose of patriotism and national success thrown in. Anna Clark shows that a more complex, contested, and changing version of our past is warranted.

She questions why sources such as indigenous and other oral history, indigenous art, and texts from authors, such as Judith Wright and Tony Birch, as well as other non-traditional sources have been ignored in the past. She also notes how history written by non-historians such as Bruce Pascoe with his book Dark Emu can raise significant controversy.

The book is structured so each chapter deals with a theme, some unconventional, such as: Beginnings; Nation; Family; Contact, Memory; Protest; Imagination and Time.

I recommend this book on a difficult but important subject. It is well researched (7 years). It demonstrates the need to thoughtfully engage with our past.
