### **Induction of Stephen Ryan**


Stephen is a qualified Chartered Accountant, member of the CPA and AICD and has a Bachelor of Commerce degree from the University of Melbourne

# Speaker for the June Meeting



**Dr. Graeme I Pearman AM** (FAA; ATSE; RoySocVic; FAMOS)

The Risk of Climate Change and its Impact on our choices about the use of Energy

S

Graeme completed his training at the University of Western Australia and commenced his career at CSIRO in 1971, eventually becoming Chief of the Division of Atmospheric Research at Aspendale in 1992. His first task was the measurement of carbon dioxide uptake by a wheat crop at Rutherglen and was sceptical about the emerging view that atmospheric carbon dioxide was increasing due to human use of fossil fuels. He established high precision aircraft measurements of the gas and its isotopes and quickly confirmed that this view was correct, posing the questions: how and why, and what might the consequences be. To address these, he established a major climate change program within CSIRO.

His presentation with show some of these results but importantly discuss the basis for assessing that the risk of climate change is serious, imminent, and long lasting. He will address how the climate change issue interfaces with our choice and use of energy options. He will also briefly discuss how specialisation can sometimes lead to policy less useful than where assessments are more holistic.


# Report of May Visit – Skydeck Eureka Tower



# Cultural Notes 1 – Opera at the Adelaide Festival

A Night at the Opera was probably the best film the Marx Brothers ever made. It certainly punctured the egos of the sanctimonious opera tragics from that era, around 90 years ago. Today many of those following this most costly art form are looking for something different. Unrequited love, family feuds, cross-dressers, and 120kg heroines dying of consumption are being replaced by grittier, if less tuneful forms of the art. (Although who would not continue to enjoy a 100kg Tosca jumping to her death from the walls of Castel Sant'Angelo only to appear a couple more times flying through the air, courtesy of what was apparently a trampoline stationed to break her fall.)


An exemplar of the new age of opera was staged at the recent Adelaide Festival. It was *Innocence* by the Finnish composer Kaija Saariaho. It was an absolutely riveting production on the very contemporary subject of a school shooting. In less than 90 minutes, a wedding celebration is disrupted by a stand-in waitress revealing that the brother of the groom was in prison for killing ten children, including her daughter, something about which the bride was completely unaware. The two-level massive rotating set included the wedding party, the kitchen, the schoolroom and other places.

The cast was international and each sang in their native language, although thankfully the surtitles were in English. At the end several dozen people who had been the off-stage chorus and the technicians operating the set appeared so with the cast of about 15 and the orchestra, well over a hundred people would have been involved.

The set and some of the cast were off to the USA after Adelaide, leaving behind a vivid memory of a night at the opera.

# Cultural Notes 2 Book Review – Killing for Country

Killing for Country by David Marr (Black Books, 2023) - Reviewed by Andrew Turner



Maureen McAlister drew our attention to a book seeking to track a revision of Australia's view of Aboriginal History after settlement at Sydney Cove. Anna Clark, the author, is a granddaughter of CH Manning Clark, himself a postgraduate of the History Dept of the University of Melbourne. Manning Clark wrote a different account of the status of aboriginal peoples post settlement after moving from Melbourne University to the Australian National University in Canberra. Anna's book is a broad brush of the historical interpretation of the interaction of European versus Aboriginal nations. I would like to bring Members' and Associates' attention to a detailed account of what interactions occurred between Aboriginal and European people.

David Marr researched his family's history and found that he had two forebears who joined the Native Police, and that their grandfather who was a greedy and ruthless businessman, lawyer and entrepreneur involved in early whaling ventures and establishing sheep stations contrary to the directions of the British Colonial Office to Governors Brisbane, Darling, Bourke and Gipps on how the natives were to be treated. All failed to provide British justice to the Aboriginal Nation as directed. Maybe it was self-preservation from the greed of the settlers.

David Marr is a lawyer and broadcaster on Radio National's Late Night Live and vividly presents in *Killing For Country – A Family History* a detailed 'account of an Australian War fought here in our country with names, dates, crimes, body counts and the remorseless acts and views of 'Sydney centred settlers'.

I recommend reading this account of how the country was settled by Europeans to get an accurate understanding of how the Aboriginal Nation was treated and how even worse was to come when 'the remnants' were rounded up, incarcerated into enclaves and treated by the early 1800s Governments. This treatment was meted out until well into my life-time. I have researched and documented that what happened in Victoria was no different to New South Wales' early settlement. Ultimately Victoria led the nation in passing 'An Act to provide for the Protection and Management of the Aboriginal Natives of Victoria 1886' and establishing the cruel and racist law now cited as 'The Aboriginal Protection Act of 1886'. The legislation was orchestrated by Alfred Deakin, Victorian Chief Secretary and Attorney General. The other Australian Governments followed with the same legislation. But that is another story.
